

March Member Focus—Peter Lourekas

My wife Elaine and I have been living in Asheville for almost five years. We are both retired now. I am a relatively new member of the ski club, having joined in January 2017. I am really glad I joined as I have been able to go skiing at Beech or Sugar with other club members during last season and the current season.



My first ski adventure happened when I was at college in Virginia in 1973. A student from Maine convinced me to go with him to try a new resort nearby. He skied the Blacks while I took the total beginners' lesson on the bunny slope. I tried a Green and then my friend suggested I try a more "challenging" trail. I became that guy who snowplows from one side of the trail straight to the other side all the way down the trail. I hated it and didn't give skiing another thought until Elaine and I moved from downtown Manhattan (where we were artists) to Westport, CT with our twin girls. (Elaine and I worked at home, so home could be anywhere.)

Friends told us to drive up to Vermont and take several days of lessons, which we did in February of 2005 at Stratton Mt. I was 53 years old and not sure I could do it, but the instructors were great and I become hooked. Thank you shaped skis; couldn't have done it without you.

Elaine dropped out the 2nd year so we started our dad-and-daughter ski outings in VT. We fell in love with Sugarbush (and Pico) and skied them every chance we had. (They also had Waffle Huts at the base of the mountain—an absolute requirement of any ski resort for my then teenage daughters.) Great snow at the end of February motivated me to improve my skill level to handle wider skis and more difficult trails.



My best skiing experience happened this past March of 2017. Daughter Simona and I went to Mt Snow in VT during her spring break from grad school. Our first encounter with Mt Snow's trails was on the morning of a blizzard. The mid-mountain trails had a few inches of fresh snow and so-so visibility, but at the summit it was a whiteout with strong winds. Luckily we found a Blue trail and skied down to the base.

They had to close the mountain that day, but the storm delivered 25+ inches of snow and the next three days were fantastic skiing. I demoed wider skis and ended up buying my first pair of skis (Rossignol Experience).

By the time you read this, I will have been on my first club trip, the Park City trip. It will be my first time skiing out West and I am sure it's going to be a great experience.

February 13, 2018 meeting

In February we met at the Twisted Laurel. Jeff reviewed the Val Gardena trip including a slide show. Doug McMillian and Erik Sandstedt spoke about our very successful ASC racing program.

Jeff asked the members present to be thinking about 2018-2019 trips and let him know about any particular interest.



There is always something to do on a holiday in Selva Val Gardena, from wonderful skiing with the plus of "ski in – ski out", an enjoyable hike and



breath-taking rock- and ice-climbing to a cozy drink in an alpine hut or a fun get-together in an après-ski bar. You certainly won't have time to get bored on a trip to Selva Val Gardena. Very true.

Carnevale is one of the biggest celebrations in Italy. No other place on earth does it like Venice. We experienced this wonderful city at its most festive and colorful time of the year. Awesome....

It isn't often that a trip with such high expectations exceeds those expectations. That was the case for this trip. The folks that enjoyed this trip were treated to a fantastic hotel in Selva with food that was a culinary treat day after day. The snow conditions were solid with ideal temperatures and plentiful sunshine. A guided tour was available every day for a bargain price of 10 euros. Just to give you an idea, the Monday tour took us around the Sellaronda with a side trip to the Marmolada.


The Marmolada glacier is certainly one of the most majestic mountains to admire. It is 10,725 feet high and has eternal snow; it is also called the "Queen of the Dolomites". From the top of Punta Rocca to Malga Ciapela every skier can enjoy 7.5 miles of slope. Just one day of a different tour offered Monday through Friday for our club members. This particular tour was spectacular with over 27 miles skied. We were thankful that the hotel had a nice spa area for us to enjoy and more importantly, to recover.

Skiing was great with endless possibilities. The Dolomiti Superski pass offers 741 miles of trails with over 450 lifts. Enough said, the skiing pictures will hopefully tell more of the story (next two pages).

A hotel on the Grand Canal and no particular agenda for the group presented a wonderful opportunity to enjoy this picturesque city in a leisurely fashion. 


ASC Park City, UT February 24-March 3, 2018



Rountree-Williams Takes 1st Place at OPA Cup in Liechtenstein

- International race brings world's best junior ski racers together -

February 9, 2018 (Malbun, Liechtenstein) — Nicola Rountree-Williams, a 15 year-old athlete from Edwards, CO and Tryon, NC and representing the USA, won the 2018 OPA Cup (Organisation des Pays Alpines) women's giant slalom alpine ski race at Malbun, Liechtenstein.

The OPA Cup, formerly known as The 7 Nations Cup, is the premier international U16 (under 16 years of age) alpine ski competition and includes the top men and women U16s from the Alpine countries of Europe. The US Ski Team attends with the USA's top U16 athletes as an invited guest. The OPA Cup includes one Giant Slalom (GS) race day, a fast but relatively tight course type, and one Slalom (SL) race day, a tight and technical course type.

After the first GS run, Rountree-Williams held 5th place behind Michelle Valentini of Italy in the lead. Rountree-Williams took the top spot with a solid second run edging out Delia Durrer of Switzerland to win by 06/100ths. Caitlin MacFarlane, of France, placed third at 24/100ths off the pace. Rountree-Williams did not finish (DNF) in the SL race.

"It was one of the most difficult hills I've ever raced on.", Rountree-Williams said. "I had a solid first GS run but knew I really had to go for it on the 2nd run to make the podium. The second GS course was a little more open and I just let my skis go and it paid off.", she said. "I didn't finish my SL race but I'm making nice progress in attacking slalom runs and creating more speed. My homework and challenge is to learn how to maintain that speed over the full course and hold on to the finish.", she added.

"This win validates the hard work that Nicola has put in over the last 12 months.", said Nicola's coach, Shaun Goodwin, a former US Ski Team women's coach. He added, "Ski racing is defined by its adversity and challenge. In the last year, Nicola has really embraced the challenges that lie in front of her. She has displayed great tolerance and focus in the face of the adversity that comes with progress in this sport. This confirms for her a great message; that if you focus on the process, results will come. I think that's a great message for athletes everywhere."

Rountree-Williams qualified to represent the USA through the US Ski Team sponsored National Performance Series (NPS) Program. The NPS Program seeks to grow and support American junior alpine ski athletes by bringing the top U16 alpine men and women from all regions of the US together periodically to train and compete. Performing well gives athletes the opportunity to represent the USA in international competition.

This season, NPS athletes attended a week-long training camp at Copper Mountain, Colorado and second camp with 2 slalom and 2 giant slalom time trials at Burke Mountain, Vermont. At Burke, Rountree-Williams achieved two 4th places in slalom and a 1st and a 2nd place in giant slalom giving her highest cumulative points among the 25 U16 women and earning her a spot on the 2018 OPA Cup Team. Five other women and six men from around the country also qualified.

Rountree-Williams heads back to Europe in April to compete in the 16th International Silvretta Schuler Cup Ski Race in Samnaun, Switzerland where she will likely compete against some of the same athletes again.

Biography - Nicola Rountree-Williams

Nicola grew up on a horse farm in Tryon, North Carolina and attended Tryon Elementary School. Her early competition experiences were show jumping and cross country equestrian events in and around Tryon. Her family made annual week-long visits to ski resorts in Colorado and Utah each year for family vacations. It was on one of these vacations that she first raced on a NASTAR amateur ski racing course and was hooked. The challenge of trying to shave a fraction of a second off her time was addictive.

In 2011, Nicola joined the Beech Mountain Ski Team (Banner Elk, NC) where she raced in the local High Country Junior Race Series and won the 2011 / 2012 series for 9 and 10 year olds.

After meeting ski racing Olympians Mikaela Shiffrin and Lindsey Vonn, both residents of the Vail Valley, and being inspired by their racing careers, at the age of 10 Nicola decided she wanted to train at the program where these amazing athletes had trained. She tried out for the Ski and Snowboard Club Vail (SSCV) U12, meaning under 12 years of age, full time program. But, after an on-snow training session and participation in a Vail Cup local race where she finished well off the pace, she was not accepted into the program. It was recommended that she try again in the future after gaining more experience.

For the 2012 season, with the goal of increasing time on snow, Nicola's family signed her up for a team in Virginia with a longer season and a larger program, and they began driving 6 hours north each weekend to Wintergreen, Virginia. A Tryon Elementary School student at the time, she also raced and trained during the week with the Polk County High School team at Cataloochee Ski Area near Asheville, NC to gain more time on snow. After a successful season in her first year of racing and training, Rountree-Williams again tried out for Ski and Snowboard Club Vail and was accepted to their full-time program. Her parents and sister moved their primary residence to Vail, Colorado where she skied with SSCV for two seasons.

For the 2015 / 2016 season as a second year U14, Nicola moved with her family to Luzern, Switzerland where she joined the Champions Team at Austria Racing Camps near Innsbruck, Austria and the Horw Ski Team near Luzern, Switzerland. While living in Europe she trained on the Swiss and Austrian glaciers in the summer and at Khutai, Tyrol during the racing season. She competed in Austria and Switzerland placing on several podiums and becoming comfortable with international competition. Under the guidance of her Austrian coach, Nicola thrived in the more demanding European training environment.

She returned to the US to compete in the U14 Championships where she placed 3rd. To finish her season, and after many years of competing at the NASTAR Championships, she finally won her NASTAR Platinum Division, the highest and fastest level, and was the fastest female from all age groups in the overall "NASTAR Race of Champions", which draws hundreds of racers from across the USA.

For the 2016 / 2017 season her family relocated back to the Vail Valley. Nicola competed in the 2016 / 2017 US Ski Team sponsored National Performance Series (NPS) where her results did not qualify her for the 2017 OPA Cup. She was disappointed in her performance and decided to work even harder, focusing on her skiing and physical and mental fitness. She qualified to represent the USA at the 2017 Whistler Cup (BC, Canada) where she finished 19th in Super G (SG), a faster and more open course, and 15th in Giant Slalom (GS), a fast but tighter course, as a first-year U16. In January, 2018, as a second year U16, she placed 4th twice in slalom (SL), a tight and technical course type, and placed 1st and 2nd in GS at the US Ski Team NPS time trials at Burke Mountain Academy (Burke, VT), achieving the highest points of all female athletes. This qualified her to represent the USA at the 2018 OPA Cup (Malbun, Liechtenstein), the premier U16 competition in Europe, where she won the OPA Cup GS race in February, 2018.

Nicola trains with her coach, Shaun Goodwin, a former US Ski Team Women's Coach and a member of USSA coaches education staff, who travels from the Denver area to train with her at SSCV's Golden Peak Competition Arena, or wherever they can find snow. On average Nicola trains just under 200 days per year on snow. After five years of homeschooling, Nicola now attends Vail Mountain School (Vail, CO).
